## Wildfire Recovery Update

*The Oregon Office of Emergency Management, in coordination with state and federal partners, distributes this update of collated and verified information on Oregon's wildfire recovery efforts.*

### **Lincoln Co. housing site almost complete**

After weeks of collaborative efforts with the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Indians, construction is nearing completion at the Logan Road RV Park in Lincoln City where up to 16 wildfire survivors will take up residence under FEMA's Direct Housing mission. Tribal leaders and representatives were on site with county and city officials, and FEMA, on Saturday, March 6, to view the manufactured homes.

Several state and federal groups have worked together to create these direct housing solutions, in order to keep survivors close to their communities. The Environmental Protection Agency began the clean up process by removing hazardous material. The Oregon Department of Transportation is now clearing hazard trees and debris as well as performing asbestos testing and FEMA has brought in trailers for direct housing. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is constructing sites in Jackson, Lincoln, Marion and Linn counties where pre-existing sites are not available.

### **Debris cleanup is ramping up**

Debris cleanup efforts continue to gain momentum and provide real results for Oregonians. The Debris Management Task Force, in partnership with FEMA and Jackson County, has identified two mobile home parks in Jackson County to participate in FEMA's Direct Temporary Housing Mission. The properties are currently being cleared of ash and debris and will be rebuilt with new utilities and fitted with temporary housing units to provide nearly 100 wildfire survivor families with a stable and safe place to stay as they plan their next steps. As of today, more than 450 home sites have been cleaned and 9,917 hazard trees have been removed.

Approximately 48 teams are working across the wildfire-affected areas to clear debris, mark fire-damaged trees, perform asbestos testing, and remove hazard trees. These parallel efforts are ongoing and prioritized to ensure a safe and efficient return to normalcy for impacted Oregonians.

## STRUGGLING WITH WILDFIRE RECOVERY? HELP IS AVAILABLE.

Times are tough and the recovery process can seem overwhelming. There are many resources to help. If you are an Oregonian in need of emergency food:

- Oregon Department of Human Services (ODHS) supports a variety of nutritional and educational programs operated through Oregon Food Bank's statewide network of 21 regional food banks. ### New fueling option for Detroit and Idhana residents

Thanks to the efforts of the Oregon Department of Energy, Marc E. Nelson Fuel Products (representing Pacific Pride fuel centers) and the Marion County Office of Emergency Management, residents in and around Detroit and Idanha have a local fueling option - a service they have been without since the September 2020 wildfires.

The station is a card lock facility located at 1477 N. Santiam Hwy in Idanha, and requires a credit application which is available from Santiam Service Integration at 503-769-9139 or at [sitmobil@santiamhospital.org](mailto:sitmobil@ santiamhospital.org). If an applicant is not approved, the station offers a deposit account option. Approved applicants are responsible for their own fuel bills.
